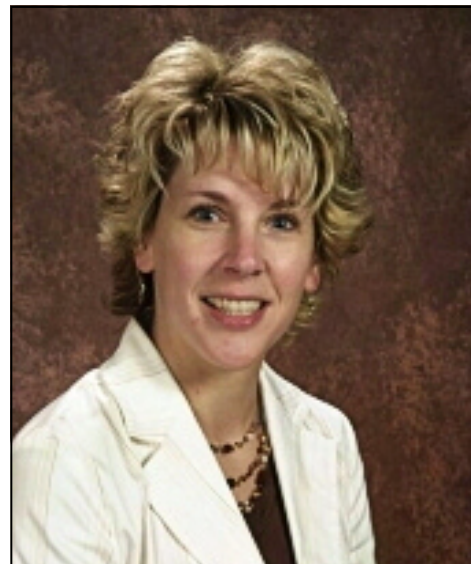

The theme of the conference will be *"The Collaborative Leader."* Headlining the presentations will be Ken Williams who will be doing the full day workshop on Wednesday, January 20, and closing the conference on Friday, January 22, will be the former NFL referee, Jim Tunney. Kenneth Williams

Ken Williams shares his experience and expertise as a recognized trainer, speaker, coach, and consultant in education and leadership. He is the chief visionary officer of Unfold the Soul, LLC, a company dedicated to inspiring individuals and teams to perform at the highest level. Skilled in developing productive, student-focused learning environments, Ken is a distinguished teacher, mentor, public speaker, and school leader. Ken is the former principal of The Learning Academy at E.J. Swint in Jonesboro, Georgia, and Damascus Elementary School in Damascus, Maryland. His leadership was crucial to creating professional learning communities in both schools.

NAESP State Representative Report by Kenny Jones

I would be remiss if I did not begin my last message to you with a resounding “THANK YOU” for allowing me to be your State Representative over the past six years. It has truly been an honor and a privilege representing such an outstanding group of principals. Serving on the board of WAEMSP has been one of the greatest learning opportunities I have ever experienced. I do want to encourage each and every one of you to become involved in WAESMP as I believe you will glean tremendous insight from your involvement.

It is hard to believe that my term is coming to a close which also means the school year is winding down at a rampant pace. I am not sure how May got here so quickly but it has and PAWS is over, yippee!! I would like to take this opportunity to share with you some information I was able to pick up from NAESP while in New Orleans in April.

NAESP has experienced a paradoxical year due to the unexpected challenges evoked by the world economic crisis. On one hand, they have taken charge of our profession, both in terms of professional standards and strategic goals for NAESP and are becoming more proactive in advocacy efforts. NAESP has also been challenged financially due to downturns in membership, annual convention registrations, sale of resources, and advertising income, however they have managed to hold steady financially.

The NAESP board and staff have incorporated a new shared leadership model to help them better work together to develop and implement the major driving strategies toward achieving NAESP’s goals in **Leading Learning Communities**.

Leading – The Leading Vision Goal encompasses our entire advocacy, standards-setting, and communications efforts on behalf of principals, schools, families, and children. We continue to be a voice at the federal level on the ongoing reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Act (ESEA) and in other policy forums.

Learning – The Learning Vision Goal encompasses all of our professional development activities and resource development and dissemination. Thousands of principals have connected and learned something new through NAESP’s Annual Convention and Leadership Academy offerings this year.

Communities – The Communities Vision Goal includes new forums and tools to connect principals based on interests, common ideas, and challenges. It also includes all of our efforts to support principals in linking to their local communities and students, like the *Sharing the Dream* grant program that provides grants for innovative ideas to engage families in schools and learning.

The NAESP staff has developed a set of high-leverage driving strategies in order to make progress toward these Vision Goals. Here are a few highlights of what is to come:

Driving Strategy A: Power of the Principal – NAESP will develop and implement an advocacy and public awareness campaign to raise the profile of principals as the educational and civic leaders committed to the academic and social/emotional success of children and youth, and, help principals advocate on behalf of children and the principalship.

Driving Strategy B: Use of Leading Learning Communities – NAESP will disseminate and promote the utilization of *Leading Learning Communities* across the field and higher education.

Driving Strategy C: Principal-to-Principal – NAESP will define, develop, and cultivate networks within the membership – in person and online – to connect principals to each other to explore issues, challenges, concepts, strategies, and opportunities.

Driving Strategy D: Know Our Members – NAESP will know and capture the unique data, needs, and aspirations of principals and provide exemplary, customized customer service.

Driving Strategy E: Project Efficiency – NAESP will evaluate and assess all existing programs and processes using a project and process management system.

Driving Strategy F: NAESP Foundation – NAESP Foundation identifies and matches funders with opportunities for targeted philanthropy supporting principals and the Association.

from my chair . . . by Layne Parmenter

Well, you can't say it's been a dull year. After a historic presidential election, it seems like the world has changed dramatically: as I visited with our legislators in February, our requests for Wyoming education were not focused on asking for more money. That's a first.

It was a surreal experience to talk with our legislators and not feel like I had my hand out like Oliver in *Oliver Twist* when he asks for a bit more gruel, "Please suh, may I have some moe." More money had already been allocated, so what was there to talk about? Well... power.

As I mentioned in a previous newsletter, we're asking as a national organization for our legislators to give us more autonomy along with accountability. First, we're asking for more autonomy in managing the human capital we need to get the job done right. Second, we're asking for more support in the form of professional development specifically for principals, both pre-service and while on the job. Finally, we're asking for a seat at the table in removing barriers and creating incentives for principals. As an example, we've asked that a representative from NAESP be a part of the grant allocation process that Secretary Duncan will oversee. Certainly there is a lot more detail to the proposals than I've outlined here, but these are the three main focus areas.

I've got to be honest, as I spoke with all three of our legislators they listened respectfully and politely to the aforementioned proposals but they were, to my point of view, very non-committal. I've had follow-up visits with all three offices by phone or email since February, and my feeling is the same: they are listening politely, but aren't taking any stand on what we're proposing as an organization.

To be fair, what would they support right now? There isn't currently any legislation to accompany NAESP's proposal; however, that may change. Some legislators have already asked NAESP for some initial ideas and "language" to get started drafting legislation. NAESP has already started looking at some legislators they believe would support and champion legislation that would move our proposals from the idea stage into reality.

I like how proactive our organization is being right now. I hope you do too. Right now, on this issue, there isn't anything to contact legislators on, but that may change in the future. Well, here's hoping you have a fabulous finish to your school year. That's it from the beltway.

The NAESP budget aligns itself with these Vision Goals and Driving Strategies. NAESP has scrutinized every line item to ensure that investment is being made where the greatest leverage can be achieved. Reflecting the precarious state of our nation's economy, they presented a budget that incurred a 5% decrease from last year - \$9,572,500. The budget was passed during the Delegate Assembly in New Orleans.

The Delegate Assembly also passed a few bylaws amendments too. They voted to change the membership year from June 1 to July 1 to run from July 1 to June 30, as you all are aware they changed NAESP voting to an electronic format from a paper ballot format, and lastly they amended the Resolution Committee make up, which has only named 3 alternates, to each zone needing an alternate which would mean 9 alternates. All in all it was a busy National Convention for NAESP.

I hope you all have a wonderful summer and are able to start it off by attending the WSA Wapiti Conference on June 8th & 9th at the beautiful Shoshone Lodge near the east gate of Yellowstone National Park. Again, thank you very much for allowing me to represent you as Wyoming's State Representative.

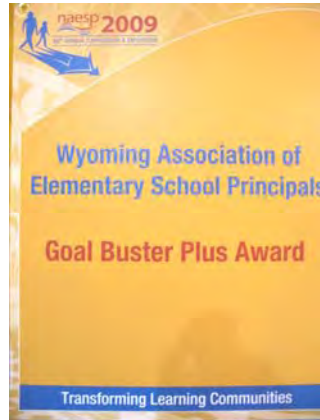

Time Bound - This goal is time bound because it has an ending date.
